I was reading a book called Facts and Myths About Snowmobiling and Winter Trails, published by American Council of Snowmobile Associations. There are many people in the world that believe snowmobiles are hurting the environment and they are trying to ban them from National Parks, etc.

- Did you know that a snowmobile exerts .5 pounds of pressure per square inch, an all-terrain vehicle exerts 1.5 pounds of pressure per square inch, a man hiking exerts 5 pounds of pressure per square inch, a horse 8 pounds per square inch and a fourwheel drive vehicle exerts 30 pounds of pressure per square inch. I am sure you are wondering what does this means; it means there is no impact on the soil or vegetation from snowmobiling. - People have stated that snowmobiles leave oil, gas and other contaminants on the snow, which contaminates the aquatic system. There have been many studies on the impact of the aquatic system throughout the country. Once the results were in, it showed the volatile organic compound concentrations were well below the EPA criteria. This means snowmobiles have little effect on the environment.

- The next thing people say is that snowmobiles are too loud. Did you know that snowmobiles built after 1975 have a sound level of 78 decibels and it would take 256 snowmobiles operating wide open to have a sound level of 102 decibels. Here are a few more examples of sound levels: leaves rustling 40-decibels, dishwasher 60-decibels, vacuum cleaner 80-decibels, lawn mower 85-decibels, blow dryer 100-decibels, car horn 110-decibels, and 75-piece orchestra 130-decibels.

- The last thing I will talk about is the impact snowmobiling has on wildlife. After numerous studies with all kinds of wildlife it showed snowmobiling has no significant effect on the wildlife population. The study also showed people on foot and cross-country skiers disturb more wildlife species than snowmobiles do.

- I believe motorized and nonmotorized recreationists need to work together on multi-use trails and back country.

Remember, people who are involved in the outdoors are happier and healthier.

Be safe and tread lightly.

The Sno-Dak News took the opportunity to chat one on one with Wendy Swenson, Marketing Director for the West Yellowstone Montana Chamber of Commerce, Destination Yellowstone

Sno-Dak News (SDN): Why did you choose West Yellowstone as your home?

Wendy Swenson (WS): We chose West Yellowstone to be able to live in a small town with an abundance of year-round outdoor opportunities.

SDN: How many lodges are located in Yellowstone? What kinds of lodging options are available in West Yellowstone?

WS: Within the immediate area there are more than 75 lodging options including seasonal cabins and dude ranches, to year-round hotels and inns, including locally owned and international chains. We have a bed and breakfast, vacation rentals by owner, forest service campgrounds and RV parks as well.

Amenities vary by lodging facility, but include pool, hot tub, waterslide, complimentary breakfast, shuttle services, snowmobile rentals and Yellowstone Park packages.

Several of our lodges are on the Historic Walking Tour.

SDN: What types of recreations are featured in or around West Yellowstone?

WS: If you can imagine it, the West Yellowstone area has it! Located just outside the West Gate to Yellowstone National Park, we are the busiest hub to the Park, year round. Several concessionaires offer guided trips over the snow (snowcoach and snowmobile) during the winter and in coaches in the summer. Bordered by Forest Service on three sides, one can enjoy mountain biking, hiking, snowshoeing, cross country skiing and more, or a sled dog ride. Hebgen Lake is just north of town, offering great fishing year-round, and hosts a North American Ice Fishing Circuit Tournament each January. Boat rentals are available at several resorts around the lake. The rivers around West Yellowstone are some of the best blue-ribbon trout streams in the country, offering analers the fly-fishing adventure of a lifetime.

SDN: What do you recommend every customer should bring to make their experience better?

WS: The logical answer we

tell our winter visitors is layers of dress to accommodate the changing temperature, but my recommendation is a camera and/or GoPro to document their adventures. Our area offers so many one-of-akind experiences that only photos can tell the story.

SDN: How many guides are offered in West Yellowstone and what guiding services do they provide?

WS: Backcountry Adventures, Two Top Yellowstone Winter Tours, and Buffalo Bus Touring Co. - Rendezvous Snowmobile Rentals are approved snowmobile concessionaires for daily trips into Yellowstone Park through the West Gate. National Forest Guided Trips outside of the Park are also available through the companies previously listed and Yellowstone, Traveler's/All these: Yellowstone Adventures, Three Yellowstone/Yellowstone Bear/See Arctic Yamaha, Highmark and High Country Snowmobile Rentals.

SDN: What kind of equipment can be rented and where are the rentals located? **WS:** The local snowmobile rental facilities offer the newest snowmobiles on the market, emission approved for Yellowstone, and the best for mountain powder riding as well. The providers also have clothing, accessories including avalanche beacons for backcountry sledding, training and guides available. All rental providers are located in West Yellowstone (which is seven square blocks).

SDN: What point of interest located in the West Yellowstone area is a must see when recreationalists visit the area or a hidden jewel not many know about?

WS: For snowmobilers, one of the more popular adventures is the Big Sky Trail because it leads right to some of the best back country, cornice riding in Montana. In the summer, we recommend visiting the Earthquake Lake Historic area and Visitor Center, just north of town. 365 days a year visitors can see grizzly bears and wolves at the Grizzly & Wolf Discovery Center (where the bears never hibernate).

SDN: What is the biggest event you host in the area?

WS: Our biggest and most long-standing snowmobile event in West Yellowstone is the Annual World Snowmobile Expo. In March of 2015, it will be the 25th Anniversary and will feature racing, aerial stunts, manufacturers revealing the 2016 models and so much more. Back again this year is the famous outdoor concerts on Friday & Saturday night for the best end-of-season party on snow!

West Yellowstone also hosts a sled dog race series, internationally recognized Nordic ski races, a North American Ice Fishing Circuit Tournament and Kids'N'Snow weekends.

SDN: Describe your grooming program. **WS:** West Yellowstone has three large PistenBulley groomers and one large track Ag tractor. Two of the three PistenBully's and the Ag tractor are leased from the State of Montana (for a minimal amount) under the State Snowmobile program, the third PistenBully is owned by the West Yellowstone Chamber.

Our local grooming program is part of the Montana Snowmobile Program, which leases several of the 20 machines used throughout Western Montana. We receive funding from Fair Share, the State snowmobile trail grooming program and from Recreation Trails Program.

Fair Share is a sponsorship program with contributions from our local businesses to help maintain the grooming of the area Nordic ski and snowmobile trails. The Montana Snowmobile Program is administered by Montana State Parks. The program's funding sources include snowmobile registration fees, gasoline taxes, dealer registration fees and nonresident permit fees.

In addition to major equipment purchases, the division administers the snowmobile grant program. Grants from this program finance the grooming of almost 4,000 miles of winter trails in Montana.

SDN: What is your favorite meal in Yellowstone?

WS: My personal favorite is the Pork Osso Bucco at the Madison Crossing Lounge, but you can't go wrong with a breakfast at the Running Bear Pancake House or Mac'N'Cheese at Wild West Pizza either! Every restaurant in town is unique with signature dishes. And there is definitely something for everyone!

SDN: Do you work with the Idaho and Wyoming snowmobile trail programs and explain how?

WS: The trails from West Yellowstone to Western Idaho are connected. While each area maintains their own trail system, the Visitor Information Center in West Yellowstone sells snowmobile permits for Idaho for convenient and uninterrupted access on the 400+ miles of groomed trails.

The trail grooming report on our website also tries to provide current conditions on some of the nearby Idaho trails.

SDN: Roughly how many hours are spent preparing the snowmobile trail system for each season?

WS: The trails are maintained by the forest service as they are multi-use for both summer and winter. The West Yellowstone grooming program coordinates maintenance and helps pick up trash during the summer with approximately 100 volunteer hours. The forest service again puts in a lot more time. During the winter our groomers run five to seven nights a week December-March.

SDN: How many groomer operators are employed to maintain the state snowmobile trail and how do they plan their grooming schedules to ensure excellent trail riding?

WS: West Yellowstone averages 10 employees and four volunteers during the winter. Some are full-time and some part-time and all are seasonal. Over the years, the grooming schedules have been developed and modified to accommodate funding and snow conditions. Schedules are developed through the grooming committee and the shop coordinator.

SDN: What types of snowmobile riding is featured in the West Yellowstone area and Yellowstone Park?

WS: Visitors can bring their own snowmobiles, or rent machines from any of our local businesses, and ride the 400+ miles of groomed trails that also connect to Idaho and venture offtrail into the mountain powder. They can also choose to reserve a snowmobile tour into Yellowstone Park with licensed providers (packages include Park approved machines, clothing, accessories and guide). A new program offered by Yellowstone National Park this winter season was a lottery for permits for selfguided tours into the Park (applications were awarded in October for the 2014-15 season).

SDN: If there is one thing you could tell people on why they should come visit, what would it be?

WS: It is a once-in-a-lifetime experience, with breathtaking scenery and authentic small town feeling.

Snow baby snow!!

Here is hoping for a great snow season!! I hope everyone had a great Thanksgiving! You know what comes after Thanksgiving? That is right, snowmobile season! Trails open Dec. 1 but remember that they need a MINIMUM of 4 inches of groomed snow to drive on the trail.

Snowmobile Safety Certification courses are going strong this winter. A HUGE thanks to all the clubs and associations who have helped Tari to get these classes scheduled so far! Remember, anyone 12 and older is required to have either a snowmobile safety certification card or a valid drivers' license to operate a snowmobile on any public lands including the state snowmobile trails.

I have listed some snowmobile tips to get you ready for the season:

 Make sure your snowmobile is in tip top running condition. You don't want to start out the season with a snowmobile that stops running when you are out on the trail. Make sure you are starting out with fresh spark plugs, fuel and check your belt for any cracks or wear. Also, double check your spare plugs and belt! • Every snowmobile should be packed with a small winter survival kit. These can come in extremely helpful if you do become stranded.

• Also, make sure your helmet is ready to go. Make sure there are no cracks or fatigue in the helmet. If there is, you need to get it replaced. Also, a helmet should always fit you snug or "just right". Remember, anyone under the age of 18 is required to wear a DOT approved helmet.

Snowmobile Safety Tips:

A snowmobile is only as safe as the driver. The key to safe operation is knowing the machine, good judgment and courtesy.

- Wear a helmet that is certified for snowmobiling and wear eye protection.
- Dress in layers with a water repellent outer layer no cotton socks.
- Your snowmobile's safety features should be kept in good working order. Do not modify your machine. Make sure that the throttle, brake, steering and light systems all function properly and read the owner's manual.
- Take a training course. Snowmobiles are not toys. Make sure your children take a training course. Children must be 12 and have taken a safety course to ride a snowmobile in North Dakota.
- Check the weather before you start and know your route.
- Always carry the minimum safety equipment: a tool kit, a knife, spark plugs, drive belt, first aid kit, rope, waterproof matches, a flashlight and an extra ignition key. Add more items to this list for long or night snowmobile trips. Maps are available at stops along the trail.
- Know your limits and the limits of your machine and stay safe in those limits.
- · Stop before crossing any road and make sure nothing is coming down the road.
- Stay off public roads. Stay on the Trail. Respect Private Property. (You wouldn't want people on your land, don't trespass on theirs.)
- Don't drink alcohol or take drugs before or while driving.
- Do not speed. Speed is the biggest factor in almost all fatal snowmobile accidents.
- Ride in a group and always let someone know where you are going.
